## Corymbia (formerly Eucalyptus) citriodora

Rain at last, and there is nothing quite like the fragrance of lemon gums perfuming the air to remind us that the rains are here. Once known as *Eucalyptus citriodora*, these stately trees were grouped with several other well-known eucs into a new genus, *Corymbia*, when genetic testing in 1995 revealed that they have more in common with the genus *Angophora* than they do with

the eucalypts. Although twenty years have passed since *Corymbia* was recognized for its unique qualities, people persist in calling them *Eucalyptus*.

Unfortunately, that name seems to strike terror into the hearts of bureaucrats (who fear that all eucs are a public safety risk), and it inspires loathing in native plant purists (who hate...well, you know...)

According to the Cal Poly San Luis Obispo tree selection guide (http://selectree.calpoly.edu/) maintained by the Urban Forest Ecosystems Institute, Corymbia citriodora has "favorable" fire resistance; "medium" branch strength, and "moderate" root damage potential. In other words, not bad for a tree that can reach 160 feet. There is a link to the Official Registry of California Big Trees, with a photo of the "National Champion", which is in Goleta. Nominated by Natalie and Barry Rossington and Randy Baldwin, this lemon gum on the old Ellwood Cooper property is 142 feet high. My 1948 edition of Trees of Santa Barbara says it was planted by Cooper in 1887. The broken branch scar in the nomination photo matches perfectly with a photo of the same tree on page 55 of Victoria Padilla's 1961 classic, Southern California Gardens.

Another lemon gum was designated a City of Santa Barbara Landmark in 1997. The "Fernald Eucalyptus Tree" near Smart & Final in the 400 block of Santa Barbara Street was planted around 1890 in the notable garden of Judge Charles Fernald, whose Victorian house was later relocated. When the lemon-scented gums at the downtown Central Library were threatened with removal (full

disclosure: I prefer the common name, lemon gums), landscape architect Bob
Cunningham gathered a

team (full disclosure: I was on it) to landmark the trees that were rendered by the architects of the Faulkner Gallery and planted around 1930. The City Council granted five trees landmark status in 2012.

Love 'em or hate 'em, *Eucalyptus* and *Corymbia* are part of our cultural landscape. People are creating the new cultural landscape all the time, and many don't want any eucalyptus species to be part of it. In September the owners of the property at the corner of State and Micheltorena Streets requested the removal of all 20 mature lemon gums, incorrectly identified as *Eucalyptus* (and, I should add, all six coral trees). The Historic Landmarks Commission continued the case pending an arborist report.

It was pesky botanists who forced the name change to *Corymbia*, and much as we might not like it, there may be a silver lining. If people ever become aware that these trees are not *Eucalyptus*, the prejudice against them might soften.
