Compost: The Latest Scoop on Soil

Whether you're looking to start your very first composting system or you're already a pocket-composting pro, learn how to harness the magic of microbes without breaking your back or the bank. We will discuss recent theories and discoveries in soil science and how new discoveries are changing the way we think and talk about different materials. We will discuss commercial composting operations, composting at home, and compost systems at schools. We will see examples of successful composting systems and discuss organizations and programs pushing the envelope to bring soil back to the concrete jungle. We will also examine a number of different commercially available products on the market right now: what makes some soil worth its weight in gold, while other soil is dirt cheap? Come early to check out four different compost systems at Trinity Gardens during the pre-meeting tour.

Matthew Vogel serves as Community Service Coordinator for Trinity Gardens. He enjoys helping educators implement holistic farm-to-school practices that engage youth to steward their own environment. In 2015 he co-founded the Growing Edible Education Symposium, a non-profit tri-county initiative to spread best practices in farm-to-school implementation and celebrate the success of farm-to-school leaders in the Santa Barbara, Ventura, and San Luis Obispo counties.

Matthew tries to visit as many new farms and gardens per year as he can. During the week you can usually find him at Trinity Gardens in Santa Barbara or at Island Seed and Feed in Goleta. Matthew holds a B.A. from UCLA in International Development Studies and a J.D. from the GW University Law School.

Pushover for Plants

Zephyranthes candida is a bulb I learned years ago when I was lucky to be one of the editors of George Harmon Scott's essential book, *Bulbs: How to Select, Grow and Enjoy*. Commonly called rain lily or zephyr flower, this perennial bulb naturalizes and can form large colonies that resemble grass until rain (or irrigation) brings out the little, white flowers. I'm a pushover for pretty plants. When I spotted what looked like clumps of *Zephyranthes* bulbs on steroids at a local nursery not long ago, I was drawn to it like a moth to a flame. It wasn't until I got it home that I noticed a label on the container, which I had failed to see because I was focused on the flowers. It said, *Milla biflora*. Thus began an epic internet quest to discover what that plant was.

Milla biflora, commonly called Mexican star, is native from Arizona through to Texas, Mexico, and Guatemala at elevations of about 3,000 to 9,000 feet. It grows from corms that produce grassy foliage and white flowers with a green stripe on the back of each of the petals. Photos of the flowers were more instructive than the texts, and after studying them on numerous web sites I'm convinced that what I have is, in fact, a *Zephyranthes*. Not only do my flowers lack green stripes, their stigmas

are not as prominent, and the stamens are different. Also convincing were two pictures posted on the Pacific Bulb Society web site by Nhu Nguyen of *Zephyranthes* growing at the U.C. Botanical Garden in Berkeley. The white flowers were much larger than usual. Their origin was Argentina.

It turns out that there are about 70 species of *Zephyranthes* native to the southern parts of the United States, Mexico, Central and South America and the West Indies. Many naturalize here and in tropical places around the globe. There are also numerous cultivars. Especially popular in the south are pink varieties, but there are several other colors. Some like rich, wet soils, and some are fairly drought resistant, appearing after it rains. I called C Star Nursery, the wholesale grower in Gardena that propagated what I purchased. They said their stock came from the old Mayflower Nursery years ago and was labeled *Milla biflora*.

To get to the bottom of this, so to speak, I dug into the container. What I saw bore the characteristics of bulbs, not corms. So it looks like I have a *Zephyranthes*--species unknown. However, now that I've seen photos of *Milla biflora* with its pretty, green stripes, I want that too.
